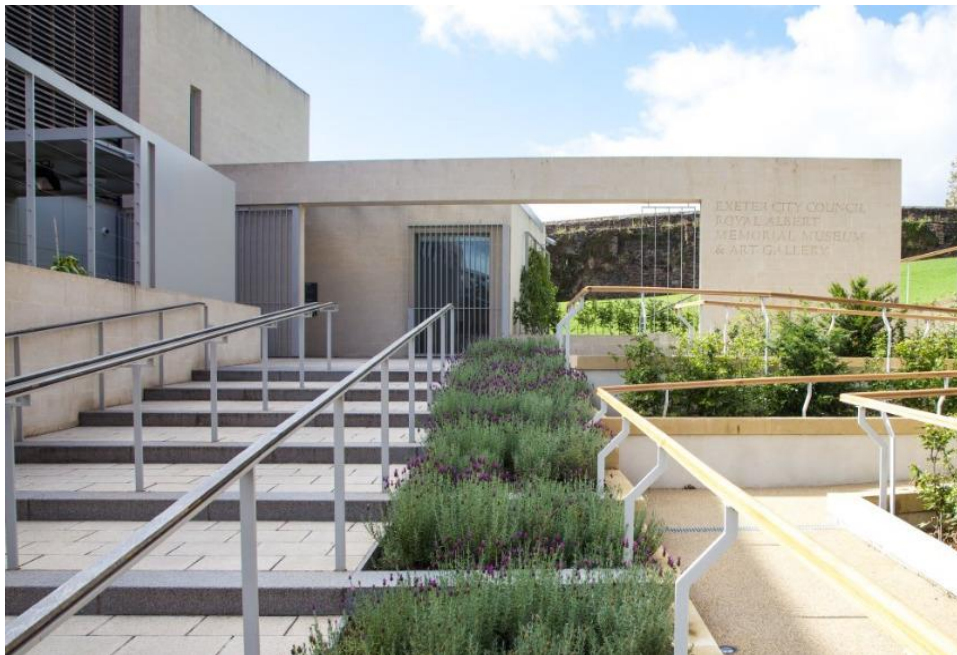
Visitors spend about 2 hours here.

1. Shep-en-mut

Mummies come from Ancient Egypt.

The mummy at RAMM was a person who died a long time ago in about 800BC.



2. Totem pole

This totem pole was made in RAMM in June 1998.

The totem pole has a name. It is called Ilchinik.

Ilchinik was a gift to RAMM from the people of the Nuuchah-nulth nation.

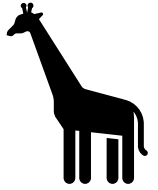
The Nuuchah-nulth people are a First Nation Americans who live in Canada.

3. Gerald the Giraffe

Gerald the Giraffe is one of RAMM's most iconic objects.



4. The Hedgeland Model

This model is of Exeter city. It shows us what Exeter looked like in the 18th century.



5. Seaton Down Hoard

A hoard is a vast amount of wealth often hidden in the ground. People would leave it hidden and then come back for it later.
